STUDENT GROWTH & DEMOGRAPHICS

CUCSS maintained strong registration levels with 219 students registering in the 2024/2025 Financial year. Since inception over 350 unique students have been supported.

At the time of writing our student community includes 42% of students that are the first in their family to undertake university study, and 10% of our total student population identify as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander people.

Primary study areas remain Health (34%), Education (20%), and Psychology/Social Work/Community Services (17%), directly addressing critical needs in our local region.

KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

MyStrengths Program:

- The inaugural MyStrengths Program delivery achieved outstanding results engaging 200+ local Year 8 students.
- Program received excellent feedback from participants and community partners.
- Subsequent delivery in 2025 has now commenced.
- Exemplifies collaborative partnership success, involving UOW, ANU, UC, and numerous community partners.

Events:

- Maintained Wellness Wednesdays and Student Connect Seminars including Community of Practice events and 3 Minute Thesis presentations.
- Held the well attended Community
 Careers and Education Showcase and
 Parents Night initiatives.

Organisational Development:

- Comprehensive Team building and Values framework development work undertaken, resulting in enhanced team cohesion and organisational clarity.
- Staff retention stable, appreciation to Amy Lawry who has moved on to other work opportunities after three years of service.
- Ulladulla Local Aboriginal Land Council Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) in place and developed to include the Dhurga room naming project for finalisation in late 2025.
- MOU development with Business Milton Ulladulla (BMU) - Local business chamber.

CHALLENGES ADDRESSED

Student Wellbeing:

- Organisational and community support enhanced following the tragic passing of a student in 2024.
- Support included ongoing grief/postvention services and enhanced mental health resource promotion.

Operational Capacity:

 Growing demand has stretched physical and staffing resources, requiring careful resource management and planning

LOOKING FORWARD

2026 priorities focus on sustainability planning, capacity building, partnership realisation, service enhancement, and Reconciliation Action Plan implementation. Ongoing projects include the Dhurga Language Room Naming Project and comprehensive marketing strategy rollout.





2025 SNAPSHOT





Here For Our Students

With the support of their local CUC regional, rural and remote students can follow their dreams when it comes to study. The CUC has responded to student needs and created an innovative model that allows choice by supporting any student, studying any course, at any Australian Tertiary Education Provider.

The wrap-around model of student services provides face-to-face academic, wellbeing, technology, administrative support in a learning community in addition to what each student's university already provides. These extra layers of support are crucial for many students who study with the CUC.

Regional students are often at greater risk of attrition. Many students are from low SES backgrounds, are the first in their family to attend university, or have caring responsibilities and multiple other commitments. The CUC offers a free, safe and welcoming environment to study with flexible and personalised face-to-face support. The CUC understands that students are individuals that need a variety of services to meet their needs so that we meet students where they are in their education journey.

Student Services



Student Community

During the 24/25 financial year, our Community Engagement Officer Sophie Linehan has facilitated 24 events attracting participation from over 70 students in activities focussed on networking, wellbeing and community engagement. Students adapted to the new event format and demonstrated leadership by planning and presenting their own events, sharing their insights and expertise. Through these experiences they enhanced their presentation and networking skills while building new relationships and lasting memories.

Our online student community Link. Tree had over four thousand clicks, indicating a high traffic usage of student engagement with information on student events and support services for our Centre. Our online booking platform was launched in August 2024, and students can now view study room availability online and can book their study sessions with ease and peace of mind. Students now have online and in person resources, tailored to life as a regional student in the Southern Shoalhaven, and interactive social media updates to keep them informed.

Students have more opportunities to participate in our local community through networking events in and out of the Centre, making important connections for life beyond study. We hear many students express the importance of this Centre for social connection and belonging, through events with each other, universities, the local high school and local organisations. Not only have we helped students develop their own unique community, but we have also connected them to important relationships to further assist their studies and careers.



LSA With Dr. Brendan Riddick

The Learning Skills Advisor (LSA) Sessions have continued to grow during the last 12 months. There are an increasing number of students booking appointments and it is becoming increasingly common for students to book regular, sometimes weekly sessions. Students booking online appointments either via email or using MS Teams have also remained constant this year. This is important for students who cannot physically attend the centre on Tuesdays or Wednesdays. The overall profile and visibility of the LSA services at the centre has grown significantly over the last 12 months and we anticipate that this trend will continue.

Joby H<u>endriks</u>

Tertiary Preparation *University of Canberra*

Getting into University would've been far more tricky had it not been for UC prep as I never got my high school certificate.

I hope to be able to go into a contemporary music course in a University down in Melbourne and make my way into the music industry.

This centre has assisted me a lot as I've studied for upcoming assignments, received help from Brendan Riddick (Learning Skills Advisor) with an essay, as well as using the wifi for music networking.

It's a relaxed atmosphere with helpful staff and the facilities are exceptional. I'm excited to see what the future will bring.

MyStrengths Program

MyStrengths is CUCSS's widening participation program, launched in partnership with Ulladulla High School in 2024. MyStrengths empowers Year 8 students with knowledge about their individual strengths and personal values through sharing stories and building relationships with local people from our community, well supported by project manager Carly McTavish.

In the 2024-25 Year, MyStrengths:

- Empowered 204 Year 8 Students with knowledge about their personal strengths and values.
- Provided 15 local university students with meaningful work opportunities as Mentors
- Partnered with 16 local organisations and businesses.
- Hosted Year 8 at 8 face-to-face program sessions
- Partnered with 3 universities.

The Outcomes:

- After participating in the MyStrengths Program, there was a 20% increase in Year 8 students who strongly agreed with the statement "I'm aware of the study or employment pathways I need to take to reach my future goals"
- After completing the MyStrengths program, confidence in understanding personal values more than doubled for half of the Year 8 cohort.
- Students who 'strongly agreed' and agreed' with the statement "I feel confident making career and study related decisions" increased by 17% after participating in the MyStrengths Program.

MyStrengths via Eastern Australian Regional University Centre Partnership, (EARUCP) is funded through the Regional Partnerships Project Pool Program (RPPPP); an initiative of the Australian Government Department of Education. EARUCP is co-led by UTS and CUC Central, in partnership with Universities and Regional University Centres across Queensland, Victoria, ACT and New South Wales. EARUCP values meaningful, sustainable partnerships and reciprocal knowledge exchange between Regional University Centres, Universities and regional and remote communities.





"My 14-year-old son had never considered university before his first MyStrengths session. He and his (tradesman) dad would always make fun of me studying for my degree – uni wasn't something my son wanted to be associated with. But after meeting one of your uni student mentors Tom, my son now has a new goal of going to uni to become an electrical engineer.

Tom went to Ulladulla High and was someone that my son could relate to, which broke down those barriers for him and changed his impression of a university student."

This has enabled confidence led decisions and better outcomes for her rather than avoidance or social compliance resulting in feelings of isolation and anxiety."

Our Social Enterprise



The Hive: Flexible Workspace

Income for The Hive in the 24/25 financial year was over \$39,000, achieving a 49.3% increase in revenue from the previous financial year, and an 80% growth in clients, and 589% growth in bookings. We currently maintain a 5-star rating on google reviews and have one permanent client. Our Hive clients are included in our community events, connecting organisations to our students and local community.

This income stream supplements government funding to enhance the ongoing sustainability of the Centre.



Essential to the success of the CUCSS has been the support of our partners, including the Commonwealth and State Governments, university partners, and community partners.
